## The Magic of Words • Words that Touch the Heart

The great influence of words is an issue and phenomenon that is often discussed in the



public eye. A casual remark can cause discomfort to the other person and sometimes leave that person unable to recover. It is common for bullying to occur at school and in society in general. On the other hand, words can also cheer us up and give us unexpected strength.

We often feel that words have magic power, both good and bad. For those of us in the school site, words are undoubtedly the greatest means of education.

Thus, there have been cases where, for example, the F-word has been uttered without our teachers' knowledge. Naturally, children become restless. It was often difficult for them to concentrate in class. We were informed of this fact through our native teachers, and we instruct our children individually and to the group as a whole that it should not be used. I would like to ask you to please instruct your children as well at every opportunity.

In any case, we would like to use nice words that empower people. At the recent World Baseball Classic (WBC), Otani's words to the players became a topic of conversation. "I understand your admiration for Major League Baseball players, as do I. But we must win this war. But we came here to win this game. So, just for today, let's stop admiring them." I think these words were truly wonderful. Perhaps it had a great impact on them. The Japanese team



won the championship. For the happiness of mankind and for the future of the children of the
